# A CHALLENGING LANDSCAPE

## The Challenge

Pennsylvania’s Emergency Management systems have been under strain for more than a decade, as the landscape around volunteerism, limited resources, and aging equipment have collectively forced a shift in this vital segment of the public safety sector.

Locally, paid municipal and mutual aid EMS programs have begun to cover broader areas across Erie County. Chronic understaffing and aging equipment are two areas where mutual aid partnerships are lifting the burden and reducing risk to response capabilities and the public.

## Strategic Investment

ECGRA grant funding has provided critical support. After meeting with leaders across the county, ECGRA began helping EMS agencies bridge funding gaps when investing in essential equipment—strengthening their ability to meet growing demands and maintain emergency services across Erie County.

# HOW ECGRA WORKS

ECGRA is endowed with local share gaming revenue from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania via the Horse Race Gaming Act. Local share gaming revenue is an assessment of the licensed gambling industry in Pennsylvania. ECGRA administers local share gaming revenue on behalf of Erie County government.

Erie County Council appoints the ECGRA Board of Directors to approve the distribution of grants and serve as a lead authority in Erie County's economic and community development ecosystem.

Since 2011, ECGRA has been led by economic development practitioner Perry Wood who serves as executive director. The ECGRA Board charged Wood with innovating and bringing to fruition a framework that uses gaming funds for impact investment, grants, and loans in Erie County.

Modeled after well-respected foundations across the U.S, in 2014, Wood and the board of directors adopted an Impact Investing Policy and began investing gaming funds to drive social, cultural, and economic change, as well as financial returns that help ensure Erie County's local share gaming revenue gives back to Erie County residents in perpetuity.

Impact investing is intentional investing — working to create a positive impact and directly benefit communities — without the use of taxpayer dollars.

ECGRA is committed to utilizing local share gaming funds to catalyze real, meaningful, and lasting impact in our community.

# EAST COUNTY EMS - EMERGENCY RESPONSE IMPROVED THROUGH COLLABORATION

With a clear mission but limited resources, the region's largest municipality is helping move Erie County forward. East County EMS was created out of necessity and an unrelenting commitment to multi-municipal cooperation. East County EMS was created to provide emergency support to neighboring municipalities.

Increased population and extended geographic coverage was straining East County EMS resources and risking response times. Another ambulance was required to provide adequate coverage to municipalities from Millcreek to Harborcreek. The East County EMS agreed to bring an expansion of services to outlying areas, and working with ECGRA leadership, developed a successful Multi-Municipal Collaboration Grant application.



**EAST COUNTY EMS BENEFITTED FROM \$100,000 ECGRA GRANT TO HELP COVER THE PURCHASE OF A NEW ADVANCED LIFE SUPPORT AMBULANCE.**

The Multi-Municipal Collaboration Grants were launched in 2012 to catalyze functional cooperation among Erie County's 38 municipalities and to support economic growth and vibrancy in the community.

In the creation of the grant requirements, ECGRA Executive Director Perry Wood worked closely with leaders from councils of governments, county authorities, and intergovernmental associations to educate them about the grant and to help coordinate the provisioning of services – the East County EMS is a shining example of how multi-municipal collaboration can help solve challenges and improve Erie County communities.
