Minutes of the Special Meeting held by the Board of Directors March 11, 2020

CALL TO ORDER

The Special Meeting of the Board of Directors of the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority was held on March 11, 2020 in the Board Room; 5240 Knowledge Parkway; Erie, PA 16510. Legal Notice of the meeting was given through an advertisement appearing in the Erie Times-News. The meeting was called to order by the Chair.

ROLL CALL

Mr. Barney, Mr. Bagnoni, Mr. Cleaver, Mr. DiPaolo, Ms. Hess, Mr. Paris, and Mr. Sample. Mr. Lee, Mr. Wachter and Dr. Wood are also present.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: I just want to take a few minutes of your time and talk about the coronavirus. There are two items I would like to address.

1. This thing is accelerating really quickly. We just talked about how Edinboro University has moved to an online system based on this and schools are potentially cancelling. We don't know what's going to happen; we've seen what's happened in other cities and other states. For our April Board meeting, we will have the option available for you, especially if you're over 55 and you're most vulnerable to this, to call in or video-skype in from the Board Effect site. I will be here with a phone and technology so we obey the Sunshine Law, but you will be able to participate that way. It is our Annual meeting and it's an important one; we don't want to miss that. If you're comfortable using the technology, we will make sure that it's available to you.

Mr. Cleaver: That's not mandatory, right? I could come here physically?

Dr. Wood: Yes, absolutely. The next item I wanted to bring up is

2. I printed out an article for you here from the Nonprofit Times. The issue of the coronavirus has overtaken a lot of communication about what's going on in the government and the nonprofit sector. If you look at what's happening in other communities, nonprofits are financially tenable if not going bankrupt in some cases, and it's because they rely upon being able to meet in person to provide their services. I'm going to reach out to multiple organizations; I've already

reached out to the Community Foundation, the Health Department, and Bridgeway Capital to get a perspective of the small business community, local government, and the nonprofit sector to see what we can do to help, if anything. If we come up with any kind of tactics, I'll bring them up to the Board next Thursday. It may be necessary to create a loan fund for some of these organizations to succeed or to be able to bridge this gap. It may be necessary to provide unexpected funding to some of the nonprofits that are on the front lines of containing this. The food bank comes to mind, for example. This is an organization that provides for people who can't leave still have access to food and certain serv ices. I just threw that out there.

I think we need to have multiple conversations with multiple funding agencies about how to do the Delphi Method – you know, we go to the oracle and yell into the cave and see what comes back.

Mr. Sample: If we create a loan fund, will these organizations have the ability to repay or would it be a grant?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: I don't know the answer to that, but it ought to be part of the conversation. Are there any observations or questions for me?

You know, I wasn't taking this seriously until just a few days ago when I realized this is in Pennsylvania and is a threat and we are one of the organizations that can help deal with it.

Minutes of the Board of Directors' Meeting March 19, 2020

Due to technical issues, this meeting's recording was unable to be heard. Minutes reflect the notes taken during this meeting.

CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Directors' Meeting of the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority was held on March 19, 2020 in the Jordan Room; 5240 Knowledge Parkway; Erie, PA 16510. Legal Notice of the meeting was given through an advertisement appearing in the Erie Times-News. The meeting was called to order by the Chair.

ROLL CALL

Mr. Barney (via Zoom), Mr. Bagnoni (via Zoom – joins late), Mr. Cleaver, Mr. DiPaolo, Ms. Hess (via Zoom), Mr. Paris, and Mr. Sample (via Zoom). Councilman Anderson, Mr. Lee (via Zoom), Mr. Wachter and Dr. Wood are also present.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Mr. Sample seconds the motion. There is no discussion of the agenda. Motion carries 6-0.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES - February 2020

Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to approve the minutes as presented. Mr. DiPaolo seconds the motion. There is no discussion on the minutes. Motion carries 6-0.

DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS

There are no comments at this time.

COMMENTS BY THE CHAIR

Mr. Paris: With the events surrounding the coronavirus and the need for social distancing, I recognize that the staff of ECGRA has put in extra work this week and I just wanted to thank them for all their hard work.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There is no public comment.

PRESENTATIONS

There are no presentations.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

a. Treasurer's Report:

Mr. Barney reviews the financial statements and asks for questions. Mr. DiPaolo asks about the Check Detail Report and the checks that have been made to Parker Philips. Dr. Wood explains that Parker Philips is the organization we use to handle all communications such as media releases, press conferences, website, newsletter, social media, and message crafting to stakeholders. The money paid to them monthly is a professional services agreement that was reached between ECGRA and Parker Philips.

Mr. DiPaolo then questions the amount of \$7,500 that we paid Parker Philips in August 2019 along with the monthly agreement amount. Dr. Wood explains that the additional amount was for the Economic Impact Update that the Board had previously approved.

Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report. Mr. Sample seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion Carries 6-0.

- b. Strategic Planning Committee: There is nothing to report.
- c. Update from County Council: Councilman Carl Anderson is present at the request of Chairman Andre Horton. Mr. Anderson thanks the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority for the foresight and willingness to act so quickly during the time of this international pandemic. Erie County Council passed a resolution urging ECGRA to create the COVID-19 Response Fund. Mr. Anderson applauded the efforts of Dr. Wood and the ECGRA Board for agreeing to administer the Response Fund.
- d. Update from County Executive's Office: Mr. Lee gives an update on how Erie County is prepared to address the social distancing, lack of work and schooling, and other effects that COVID-19 may have upon Erie County. Although we don't know what to expect, the County will be working closely with the Erie County Department of Health to do what is in the best interest of the citizens of Erie County.

At this point, Dr. Wood addresses the possibility of students needing to be home-schooled in the event of a quarantine. He mentions that he has been in touch with the Erie County Library system and the EPS Superintendent about utilizing internet hotspots for those without access to broadband at home. Dr. Wood states that this may be a need he will bring to the Board soon. Research is in progress.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Due to limited time, Dr. Wood foregoes giving his report.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

Due to limited time, Mr. Wachter forgoes giving his report.

OLD BUSINESS

a. Ignite Erie 12-month Contract Extension – Dr. Wood was approached and asked if the Ignite Erie project could have an extension, as they have been unable to fully complete the work in the amount of time previously agreed upon. Because of the length of the extension, Dr. Wood is asking the Board to approve the staff to grant up to 24-month extensions on all grants due to the unique circumstances faced by the COVID-19 crisis. Many nonprofits will be delayed or unable to accomplish their projects in the near future.

Mr. Sample makes a motion to give the staff the ability to grant 24-month extensions when appropriate. Mr. Cleaver seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion carries 7-0.

NEW BUSINESS

- a. Resolution Number 2, 2020 Resolution to enter into agreements with 44 Erie County Special Events grant applicants for the year 2020.
 - Dr. Wood reads the resolution.

Mr. DiPaolo asks if there is a conflict of interest for him to vote for this resolution as he is a parishioner of Sacred Heart Church. Mr. Wachter reviews what an actual conflict of interest is, stating that he or someone in his immediate family would have to receive financial gain from supporting this resolution. Since that is not the case, Mr. Wachter assures Mr. DiPaolo that he will not be in conflict by voting for this resolution.

There is discussion about the logistics of awarding the funds to events that may not happen due to social distancing rules. Dr. Wood and Mr. Maggio informed the Board that they will be issuing the checks on a grant-by-grant basis as the individual events near execution.

- Mr. Sample makes a motion to approve the Special Events funding. Mr. Cleaver seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion carries 7-0.
- b. Resolution Number 3, 2020 Resolution to approve the Employment Contract of the Executive Director.
 - Dr. Wood reads the resolution.
 - Mr. Sample makes a motion to approve the resolution. Ms. Hess seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion carries 4-3, with Mr. Bagnoni, Mr. Cleaver, and Mr. DiPaolo voting in the negative.
- c. Resolution Number 4, 2020 Resolution to Adopt the 2020-2021 Budget.
 - Dr. Wood reads the resolution.
 - Mr. Cleaver discusses the fact that the Board just passed the Executive Director's contract, in which there was a significant raise. He also states that the numbers in the budget reflect higher raises than cost of living for both Mr. Maggio and Ms. Michali. His opinion on the matter is that even though Dr. Wood did a fine job in cutting other areas of the budget, there should be an even bigger cut. Mr. Cleaver feels that the Board should no longer agree to pay for the monthly services to Ridge Policy Group for the lobbying services they provide. Mr. DiPaolo and Mr. Bagnoni agree that the Ridge Policy Group contract should be discontinued.
 - Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to accept the budget if it is amended to no longer include Ridge Policy Group. Mr. DiPaolo seconds this motion.
 - Mr. Paris asks Dr. Wood if he has anything to say regarding the Ridge Policy Group. Dr. Wood insists he has said all he can about Ridge Policy Group and their effectiveness in monthly reports and past board meetings. He has no further comment.

There is no further discussion.

The motion to accept the amended budget eliminating Ridge Policy Group's contract carries 4-3, with Ms. Hess, Mr. Paris, and Mr. Sample voting in the negative.

- d. Resolution Number 5, 2020 Resolution to Create a COVID-19 Response Fund
 - Dr. Wood reads the resolution. This resolution creates a pot of \$500,000 to be used for grants in the area of immediate human relief.
 - Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to accept the resolution. Mr. Sample seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion carries 7-0.
 - Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to combine the next three resolutions (Resolution Numbers 6, 7, and 8) as they are all related to funding that will alleviate the economic effects of COVID-19. Resolution Number 6 will place up to \$800,000 at Bridgeway Capital to make loans to small businesses in Erie County negatively impacted by the crisis. Resolution Number 7 will place up to \$800,000 at Bridgeway Capital to make loans to nonprofits in Erie County negatively

impacted by the crisis. Resolution Number 8 will place up to \$250,000 at the Erie County Redevelopment Authority to make loans to small businesses in Erie County negatively impacted by the crisis. Mr. Sample seconds the motion to combine the resolutions. There is no further discussion. Motion carries 7-0.

- e. Resolution Number 6, 2020 Resolution to Create a COVID-19 Small Business Loan Fund
- f. Resolution Number 7, 2020 Resolution to Create a COVID-19 Non-Profit Loan Fund
- g. Resolution Number 8, 2020 Resolution to Support the Erie Redevelopment Authority with a Small Business Loan Fund

Mr. Sample moves to approve all three resolutions. Mr. Cleaver seconds the motion. There is no further discussion. Motion to approve all three resolutions carries 7-0.

Mr. Cleaver moves to adjourn.







RE: Act 15 of 2020 SB 841

COVID-19 Disaster Emergency and Municipalities and Authorities

On April 20, 2020, the Governor signed Senate Bill 841, Act 15 of 2020 into law.

Among other matters, Act 15 amends the Health and Safety Code, Title 35 to include a new Chapter 57, entitled COVID-19 Disaster Emergency. This new Chapter 57 directly effects municipalities and municipal authorities.

This Act provides for, in applicable part, municipal property tax relief, local government meetings and land use matters during that period of time covered by the Governor's Proclamation of Disaster Emergency issued on March 6, 2020 (the "COVID-19 Disaster Emergency"). This memo outlines those provisions directly applicable to municipalities and municipal authorities.

1. Property Tax Relief.

The Act provides for temporary authority to Taxing Districts, defined as including cities, counties, borough's and townships, to offer certain property tax relief during the "COVID-19 Disaster Emergency". This authority is not provided to School Districts.

Specifically, the governing body of the Taxing District may vote to either (1) extend the discount period for the property tax currently due to a period no later than August 31, 2020, or (2) waive the late payment fee or penalty if the property tax is paid in full by December 31, 2020. The action need only pass by a majority vote. Governing bodies are not required to take action and have local discretion to determine whether they wish to grant such relief.

2. Local Government Meetings.

The Act allows for phone or internet web conference public meetings and hearings to occur during the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency.

Political subdivisions, including but not limited to authorities, borough councils, and boards of township supervisors, and all board and commissions under such political subdivisions, that are covered by a declaration of disaster under section 7501(d) of the Emergency

Management Services Code, 35 Pa.C.S. §7501(d), are authorized to conduct public meetings or hearings using an "Authorized Telecommunication Device" during the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency. This authorization does not pertain to School Districts. The declaration of disaster may be issued by the Governor, the Mayor, the County Council or Executive, or the Board of Supervisors.

An Authorized Telecommunication Device is defined as including audio communications at a minimum, and would include telephone conferences, internet conferences with video and audio capability, and similar technology (a "tele or web conference").

To hold a tele or web conference the political subdivision must "to the extent practicable" post prior notice of the meeting on its website, in the newspaper, or both. The notice is to include the date, time, technology to be used and public participation information. I address public participation information below.

Note that this does not alleviate Sunshine Law advertisement obligations, and you still have to advertise the meeting in the newspaper. Also, I believe that it would be sufficient for the public notice to direct the public to the agency's website for the specific information relating to how to view the meeting, such as a Zoom or YouTube Live link.

The public has a right to participate in the meeting, "to the extent practicable," through participation in the tele or web conference, or through submitting written comments. Written comments may be submitted via US mail or to a designated email address.

If you have the technology to allow the public to view the meeting through a platform such as YouTube Live, or to provide a link for them to participate through Zoom or similar technology, that would be allowable. If you do decide to provide a link to allow the public to have electronic access to your meeting, proper attention should be given to the security concerns we have recently seen with incidents of "Zoom-bombing."

You are also permitted to hold a tele or web conference meeting without advance notice to the public to address any issued related to the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency if you post draft minutes of the meeting within twenty (20) days of the meeting or at some point before the next regularly scheduled meeting, whichever is earlier. The Act does not define what it means to "post" the minutes, but I recommend that you post the minutes at your main office and on your website.

Additionally, the Act suspends any physical quorum requirements, such as the requirement included within the Borough Code. This suspension is not only during the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency, but also at any time a Disaster Emergency is declared by a competent authority.

3. Land Use Matters.

The Act provides for the manner in which municipalities, zoning boards and commissions may continue to handle land use matters. Commissions, zoning boards, boards of supervisors, borough councils and similar bodies may meet using the tele or web allowances noted above, so long as they post the appropriate notice and take appropriate steps to allow for public participation.

A board or commission may not consider an application, plat, plan, submission, appeal or curative amendment unrelated to the COVID-19 Emergency Declaration without first providing notice to the public and interested parties at least five (5) days prior to the meeting. Such prior notice shall be given via a post on the municipality's website, in the newspaper, or both. This notice is in addition to the other standard and required notices.

The Act is unclear as to what the notice must say, but my advice is to provide notice of the date and time of the meeting or hearing, notice of the technology to be used and how the public can participate. The public participation requirements are the same as tele or web conference meetings for political subdivisions, as noted above.

Additionally, If the law requires action in consideration of any application, plat, plan or other submission for an approval or for an action or an appeal or curative amendment during the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency, statutory time limits are now suspended and tolled as of March 6, 2020, which was the date of the COVID-19 Emergency Declaration. If the application or appeal was received during the period of the COVID-19 Emergency Declaration, the time periods shall not begin until 30 days after the effective date of the Act. The Act is effective immediately, and thirty days after the effective date is May 20, 2020.

Notwithstanding the extension of the timelines, an applicant may request a meeting, hearing or proceeding be held during the period of COVID-19 Disaster Emergency. The request must be made no later than May 20, 2020.

If the request is made, the governing entity, such as the zoning board or commission, borough council or board of supervisors, as may be applicable, "shall have the discretion to proceed with [the] request." If the hearing or meeting does occur as requested, the applicant, interested parties, and anyone who received actual notice of the proceeding is deemed to have waived any objection or challenge to the hearing or meeting under the Sunshine Law or any other applicable law.

Lastly, the applicable board or commission is required to provide written notice to each applicant of the time extensions and of their right to request that a meeting or hearing be scheduled during the period of COVID-19 Disaster Emergency.


4. Expiration.

With the exception of the elimination of a physical quorum requirement during a period of disaster emergency, these provisions relating to powers granted during the COVID-19

Disaster Emergency are temporary, and shall expire upon the expiration of the Governor's Proclamation or when it is terminated.

Resolution to Fund Applicants Selected through the Immediate Human Relief Grant Program As part of the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund

WHEREAS, COVID-19 pandemic poses a threat to Erie County, as a significant public health, economic, and mental health crisis;

WHEREAS, Erie County Council passed a resolution requesting that ECGRA create the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund (the "Fund") on March 17, 2020;

WHEREAS, the ECGRA Board of Directors responded to County Council's request on March 19, 2020 by establishing the Fund, which included an Immediate Human Relief grant program;

WHEREAS, Immediate Human Relief was defined as including: 1) food insecurity, food delivery systems, and food pantries, 2) homeless shelters and homeless prevention, 3) eldercare, and emergency response for the elderly, and, 4) childcare, and children effected by the crisis;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency declared by the Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and due to the need to make funding immediately available through the Immediate Human Relief portion of the Fund, the ECGRA Board of Directors authorized and directed the Executive Director to (1) work with staff to analyze and review Immediate Human Relief grant applications; (2) to provide each individual Board Member with information regarding the grant applications and related staff recommendations, and to allow the individual Board Member to offer advice regarding whether he or she had any objections to the staff recommendation; (3) where no objections existed, to award grants to qualifying applicants and to distribute the grant dollars in a timely fashion; and, (4) to present the awards to the Board for retroactive approval at the April 23, 2020 meeting.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority, pursuant to the Economic Development Financing Law, hereby retroactively approves the award of twenty-five (25) grants that were issued in accordance with staff recommendations to provide Immediate Human Relief during the period of the COVID-19 Disaster Emergency, as are attached to this resolution.
