Minutes of the Board of Directors' Meeting February 18, 2021

This meeting is held via Zoom due to Governor Wolf's orders to stay at home during the time of this COVID-19 crisis.

CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Directors' Meeting of the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority was held on February 18, 2021 via Zoom with a link that was provided to all Board members by the Executive Director. An agenda containing the Zoom link to this meeting was posted on the ECGRA website and at 5240 Knowledge Parkway, Erie, PA 16510. Legal Notice of the meeting was given through an advertisement appearing in the Erie Times-News. The meeting was called to order by the Chair.

ROLL CALL

Mr. Barney, Mr. Cleaver, Mr. DiPaolo, Ms. Hess, Ms. Loll, Mr. Paris, and Mr. Sample. Mr. Lee, Mr. Wachter, and Dr. Wood are also present. It is mentioned that Ms. Loll's computer does not have audio or video options and will be participating in the meeting via the chat function in zoom to discuss or ask anything as well as to cast her votes for motions.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Mr. Cleaver makes a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Mr. DiPaolo seconds the motion. There is no discussion of the agenda. Motion carries 7-0.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES - January 2021

Mr. Barney makes a motion to accept the minutes. Mr. Sample seconds the motion. There is no further discussion on the minutes. Motion carries 7-0.

DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS

Ms. Loll: I just wanted to thank Tammi for answering all my questions.

Ms. Michali: You're very welcome.

Mr. Cleaver: When is the end of your term, March 31?

Mr. Paris: It will be at the reorganization meeting in April.

Mr. Cleaver: So, year-end is March, and we start again come April 1st?

Mr. Paris: Technically, yes. But this is something that needs to be voted on so I will be in place until that meeting in April.

Mr. Cleaver: I see that the annual meeting is on April 15th.

Mr. Paris: Yes, that would be it.

COMMENTS BY THE CHAIR

Mr. Paris: Not many of you were here, but I wanted to let everyone know that Dr. Lynn Corder, who served on the Board for quite awhile before David Bagnoni took his place and now Carol Loll is there, but Lynn passed away about a week and a half ago and I just wanted to let those of us who knew him that we are thinking of him.

Mr. Cleaver: Who passed away?

Mr. Paris: Dr. Lynn Corder. I believe he was the Superintendent of the Northwestern School District.

Mr. Wachter: That sounds right.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There is no public on the call for comments.

PRESENTATIONS

There are no presentations at this time.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

a. Treasurer's Report: Mr. Cleaver: As we discussed at the last meeting when I accepted the Treasurer's role, I have always felt – and still do – and I've talked to Perry about it, since he does all the bill-paying and invoices, that I would just turn over the Treasurer's Report to him. I reviewed it with him yesterday; I have no comment but the rest of the Board may.

Mr. DiPaolo makes a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report as reviewed by Mr. Cleaver.

Mr. Sample seconds the motion.

Mr. Cleaver: I should ask, do you have any comment at this time, Perry, on the Treasurer's Report?

Dr. Wood: No.

There are no questions or further discussion of the Treasurer's Report. Motion carries 7-0.

- b. Strategic Planning Committee: There was no meeting held so there is nothing to report.
- c. Update from County Council: Mr. Anderson is not present to give an update.
- d. Update from County Executive's Office: Mr. Lee: Good morning, everyone. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I just want to go over the highlights for the Summer Jobs Program. As many of you are aware, the County did make the award to GECAC last Thursday, February 11, 2021. It was a very good process. We really worked as far as the cost; that has been very important to me. Since the inception of the program, the County has not had to go back to County Council nor have we had to come back to ECGRA to ask for any type of increase in dollars and we are very pleased with that. That is with kudos to our finance team for staying on top of that and making sure that everything should be in line from a cost perspective.

The proposal that was accepted, it did go up 9% and it varied the number of students. It is based on two years with an additional two-year renewal if it is chosen to go down that avenue. It is predicated upon 100 students, 150, 175, and 200 students. The majority of the time we average between 150 - 170; last year it was 90 students which we were very pleased with that number because we were, and we are still, working through the pandemic. This year we are expecting maybe about the same or just a little bit more.

The 9% increase was due solely to GECAC looking to bring someone on full-time to oversee this program. We are going to make sure that they are going to follow the objectives that were put in their proposal as far as what this individual is going to do. It is going to give them more lead time for recruiting and working with the schools. I just cannot say enough of the leadership of Sylvia last year; she led the program very well. Unfortunately, she is no longer with GECAC, but we are confident that whoever they select, this individual will be just as passionate and just as competent to lead the program.

That was the big news as far as it pertains to the partnership that the County has with the Gaming Authority; we are excited. Are there any questions that I can address at this time? Mr. Chairman, that concludes my report. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: Good morning, everyone. If you take a look at the Executive Director's Report in your packet, you will see that the first thing is from the Finance Department of the County that the fourth quarter gaming revenue came in, and it came in on time. We were just reviewing that recently, so we will be updating the revenue dashboard. Next you will see a thank-you letter from Mercyhurst University followed by the agendas for the COVID Task Force. The Economic Impact & COVID Revitalization Task Force has been meeting – this is just a reminder that these meetings are weekly and are held on Wednesdays. ECGRA sets up the Zoom on behalf of the County Council Task Force and then Chairs Anderson and Clear run the meeting. ECGRA provides the support for it; it has been going quite well. We have had provided them with guest speakers in the area of economic development.

We are working internally on a survey of our Main Street partners to see how they have been affected by COVID and we are also working with external partners on data sources they have collected from the Economic Research Institute of Erie to The Nonprofit Partnership here in town which is an association of nonprofits. There is also a couple of articles in there that have gone forth with some publication of our efforts.

I also wanted to tell you that the staff is working on a special report on the results of the COVID Response Fund. March will be exactly one year since we launched that Fund in the midst of COVID and participated in helping to fund immediate human relief and the loan funds that were created to help small business and nonprofits. We are going to do a special report for the Board and bring it forth showing how the timeline unfolded and where we're at with that.

I will wrap up my comments by saying that I have been working with the Treasurer on the finances, and that includes at this time of year the proposal of a new budget. A new budget will be on the docket to be voted on in April, so we have begun that process as a staff to analyze costs. The next step is to go to the Treasurer and have a discussion with him about a draft budget, and then to provide that draft budget to the Board of Directors at the March Board meeting for your comments and reviews. We can have discussions on line items and their purpose in the budget. That budget will also include recommendations for increases or decreases of certain line items and it will include recommendations for any kind of cost-of-living increase for employees. That is part of the discussion we ware having with the Treasurer right now. We will bring forth options there, and then we will have a full discussion as a Board. The budget will also include moving to a health insurance plan which is something Tammi is currently researching with both Highmark and UPMC.

Are there any questions for me?

Mr. Cleaver: Just to clear this in my mind, you are requesting two bids or proposals for health insurance coverage for the staff and yourself, right?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: That is correct. We are requesting quotes from those two entities.

Mr. Cleaver: And we're going to put that into effect for when, the new year which would happen on April 15th at the Annual meeting?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: Yes, because that is the start of the new fiscal year.

Mr. Cleaver: Thank you. I just wanted to make sure I had it clear in my mind.

Mr. Lee: Dr. Wood, I have a couple of questions. The COVID-19 initiative that you are working on with Council Council, I know you had the opportunity to have Bruce Katz speak, which I thought was great; do you have any idea of some of the other guest speakers that you may be bringing in for the Council to hear?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: Next Wednesday we are having Adam Bratton from the Nonprofit Partnership come in and talk about the surveying that was done of nonprofits in the midst of COVID last year. Part of the discussion will be that they would like to do some follow-up surveying and they would like to know what kinds of questions they should be asking based upon what the task force is interested in. Other guest speakers have been there is a newly funded women's business center, which is an SBA concept, and we've also had Dr. Ken Louie from the Economic Research Institute of Erie come in and talk to us about the indicators project that Behrend's economics' department works on quarterly.

Mr. Lee: If we wanted to attend the meetings, how would we go about it, Dr. Wood?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: Tammi can send you a link to the Zoom meeting. They are publicly advertised according to Sunshine Law and anyone is welcome to participate. From the Administration, Honey Stempka has been attending the meetings.

Mr. Lee: Wonderful. I am aware that she has attended the meetings. Thank you. I think that is a great project. The last question I have is in reference to I know that ECGRA had stepped up to work with the various Community Centers. I know you were working with Mr. Horton, Mr. Sherrod, and Mr. Hilliard at the Booker T. Washington Center on the food insecurities. I just wanted to know if there has been any continuing talk about that and is there any role that the Authority may be playing in that going forward?

<u>Dr. Wood</u>: That is a great question. There hasn't been any further dialog moving forward on that probably since, what would be a good term, suspending the COVID Response Fund. So, no, we have not had any further discussions. It doesn't mean that we can't though. I think we should be open to those.

Mr. Lee: Okay. Thank you, Dr. Wood.

Dr. Wood: Are there any other questions for me? If not, thank you for your time.

Innovation Entente Lab opens new digs, expands support to region's entrepreneurs

Expand is the operative word given the March 1 opening of Mercyhurst University's new Innovation Entente Lab (IEL) as well as the launch of its mobile unit, the hiring of new staff,



and increased geographical coverage.

The IEL, part of the NWPA Innovation Beehive Network

(https://www.nwpabeehive.com/) formed in 2014 to enhance business expansion and development in the region, combines the university's strong expertise in applied sciences with its rich tradition of liberal arts education to help promote community entrepreneurship and innovation.

IEL team members help clients identify key marketing strategies, potential funding pipelines, and the necessary strategic media options to help place entrepreneurs and small business owners on the path to success.

Thanks to the combined effect of recent grants, what was once a makeshift research lab has morphed into an uber-modern facility with 15 work stations, robust technological capabilities, two large wall monitors for projecting data, two MacBook Pros for graphic design, and a conference and presentation area.

Although the IEL staff, headed by Brian Fuller, and comprised of Mercyhurst undergraduate and graduate students, has been producing products for some time from various venues on campus, this marks the first time they have had a dedicated space, the result of an \$89,000 grant from the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority.

The new space, which is situated on the ground floor of the library, just south of the Cyber Education Center, was designed in part with input from Mercyhurst's interior design and graphic design students; there's even an alumni connection. The lab's conference table was handmade of repurposed barn wood at Willow Creek Barn Wood Furniture in Edinboro, which 2015 Mercyhurst alumnus Casey Brown co-founded with his father, Chris. Casey's sister, Kennedy, is also a Mercyhurst graduate, Class of 2020.

A more recent three-year grant of \$376,000 from the Appalachian Regional Commission allows the IEL to provide more direct, on-site support by taking teams of students on the road to serve clients in their own environs. Until recently, the IEL had served a five-county area, but has since expanded its regional coverage to include 17 counties, including parts of New York and Ohio. The funding has also prompted the expansion of the IEL workforce, from two to three student teams and the hire of a new assistant director, Abbey Lesniewski, who oversees the lab's day-to-day operations and coordinates its mobile capabilities.

Fuller said the IEL averages 40 clients a year. "With the latest grant," he said, "we have gone from 12 to 15 student analysts and are looking to increase production by 25 percent this year and another 40 percent in years two and three."

While the program's expansion bodes well for the university, it's students, local entrepreneurs and small business owners, Mercyhurst University Provost Dr. Leanne Roberts recognizes the collaboration among area universities and Blasco

Library as being the key to continued success.

"The Innovation Entente Lab is the direct result of Mercyhurst's participation in the Northwest Pennsylvania Innovation Beehive Network," Roberts said. "Since its inception in 2014 from an Ignite Erie Grant, the Network, comprised of the four local universities – Mercyhurst, Edinboro, Gannon, and Penn State Behrend – and the recent addition of Blasco Library – has worked to enhance business expansion and development in the Erie area. The Innovation Entente Lab is now one of five grant-funded centers that collaborate to encourage business growth with each location offering its own specialized area of expertise."

County awards GECAC with Summer JAM contract

Erie County government has awarded a 2021 contract for the Summer Jobs and More program to the Greater Erie Community Action Committee.

This will be the seventh year that GECAC has operated the program.
In 2020, the Summer JAM program provided op-

portunities for more than 30 employers to offer posi-

tions to approximately 89 Erie County youth.

More than 60% of participating youth were under 18 years old, and 65% were new to the program. Because of the pandemic last summer, participation was lower than in the previous years, but GECAC implemented an appropriate strategy to work through it, and the Erie County Department of Health provided COVID-19 safety training to these youth.

"GECAC's consistent, creative and concentrated ef-forts of the Summer JAM program have demonstrated their commitment to the growth and development of

Erie County," said Gary N. Lee, the county's director of administration. "We are proud to continue this part-nership with them and appreciate their solid investment in, and impact on, our youth.

GECAC offers recruitment and informational ses sions for employers and participants through virtual meetings, outreach at local schools and community centers, social media blasts, and outdoor pop-up events. Youth are matched with employers based on the employer specifications, geographic proximity and availability of reliable transportation for youth. Then, GEGAC provides orientation and training sessions.

The Summer JAM program is a collaborative effort of Brie County, GECAC, the Brie County Gaming Revenue Authority and the Erie Community Foundation. The program is open to Erie County residents ages 16 to 21 who meet the program's household income guide-

The collaboration has invested approximately \$2.3 million while developing more than 1,000 youth leaders since the program's inception in 2014.

Plans to seek Downtown Historic District designation

A little history can help shape the future. • Girard Borough is joining a growing list of Erie County municipalities that are building on their past to attract visitors and grow business. • Girard is developing a master plan on ways to use its history to revitalize its downtown.

FILE /ERIE TIMES-NEWS "We want to create a look and feel for downtown that people want so that they're willing to visit, eat, do some shopping and see what we have to offer," Girard Borough Manager Rob Stubenbort said.

"A good-looking downtown area in a small town is the face of the town. We want to be sure we're seen at our best," Stubenbort said.

Girard Borough also plans to seek Downtown Historic District designation from the National Register of Historic Places to help draw new business and visitors.

And that can help rejuvenate the town, sald Wendy Naylor, of Naylor Wellman Historic Preservation Consulting, based near Cleveland. The firm worked with the Lawrence Park Historical Society to get a National Register listing of the township's original commercial and residential district, including its iconic row houses, in 2018.

What the National Register listing does is qualify income-producing buildings in the historic district for state and federal tax credits," Naylor said. "The motivation behind the tax credits is to get those buildings back in use and get businesses in and generating tax reve-

nues.
One building rehabilitation sparks
others, Naylor said. "Once you get one
building rehabilitation going downtown
it's contagious," she said. "Others follow. It's really fun to watch."

The historical designation also drives tourism, Naylor said.

You use that story that makes you unique to promote your town," she said. "It becomes the basis for heritage tourism and just promoting the town as a wonderful historic community."

Girard's unique story includes that it once was the home of the Dan Rice Circus. Rice, who is credited with creating the Uncle Sam character, wintered his nationally known show in Girard in the

mid-19th century. Very different histories are the basis for Waterford and North East National Register designations.

The North East Historic District includes Gibson Park, downtown com-mercial and residential buildings and the historic property that most recently

was home to Mercyhurst North East.

The region's agriculture, including grape farming and the wine industry, also helps boost tourism. North Rast is on the Lake Erie Wine Trail, linking wineries from Harborcreek to Silver Creek, New York. The Sustain North East Injtiative currently is seeking funding for new plans to improve downtown build-ings, attract residential and commercial tenants and improve streetscapes

Waterford was the site of three French and Indian Wars era forts, including the French Fort LeBoeuf. The town also boasts the iconic Eagle Hotel. Fort LeBoeuf and Judson House museums, and Washington Park, featuring a statue commemorating George Wash-

ington's visit to Fort LeBoeuf in 1753.

The Washington statue is a particular draw for tourists, said Jim Edwards, president of Fort LeBoeuf Historical Society. "During the summer, there may be 20 people in the park one day and one or

two the next, with cars pulling over to take pictures," Edwards said. "It really does draw people who come into the museum too and have lunch at the Eagle

Additional plans include erecting a monument honoring Civil War hero Strong Vincent, who was born and raised in Waterford.

That kind of historical promotion

could help Girard, said Pat Harvey, a pharmacist at Girard Pharmacy.
"I think Waterford has done a really

nice job with their downtown, and I'd like to see something similar to that here," Harvey said. "We have a historic past here also. We didn't have George Washington, but we had Dan Rice, and that could be almost as good."

"Our main work is trying to organize the funding for downtown," said busi-nessman George Drushel, chairman of Downtown Girard. "People already have taken advantage of facade grants, marketing grants and also block grant money available for residential homes along Main Street

leverage additional funding and additional interest in Girard. Drushel said.

"I think if we're able to get that and promote that, more people will visit the historical sites that we have," he said.

Girard's master plan will include a market analysis of its assets, historical and otherwise; a branding and marketing strategy to promote downtown Girard to visitors, and guidelines to design building and infrastructure improvements and maintenance.

The plan will guide downtown pres-ervation, rehabilitation and development for two decades, Stubenbort said.

A \$20,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission and a \$10,000 grant from the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority will fund planning costs.

Urban Vantage and Preservations

Studios of Buffalo, New York, have been hired to guide Girard planning and his-toric preservation. Urban Vantage will help prepare the downtown master plan Preservation Studios will prepare the National Register nomination.

Girard Borough also is surveying residents about amenities, attractions and events that they'd like to see in their downtown. The survey is available on borough website www.girardborough.com.

"We also want the people who live here in Girard Borough to have what they want so they don't have to leave the borough to shop or eat or attend an Stubenbort said.

Public meetings will also be held to gather community ideas, he said. Some events will be held virtually due to the

COVID-19 pandemic.
"We invite everyone to participate in the upcoming surveys, discussions, and other chances to be part of the planning process. The more ideas and comments, the better," Stubenbort said.

Projects aim to boost quality of life in neighborhoods

When Michael Wolfe launched his sweat equity-fueled redevelopment project on West Eighth Street, the 51-year-old had no idea that an active, well-funded neighborhood organization existed in that area.

He does now.

Wolfe and his wife Katie Raezer moved to Erie from the Carlisle, Pa. area five years ago, looking to start fresh in "a smaller city that still had a hometown feel.

In late 2019, the couple purchased the building at 463 W. Eighth St. as an investment opportunity. It includes six one-bedroom apartments and housed on the first floor Pie in the Sky restaurant until it closed in summer 2018.

"We're doing a lot of the work ourselves," said Wolfe, a former truck driver whose wife is an information technology professional.

"I think it was one of the contractors who told us about Our West Bayfront. We were able to get an \$8,000 grant from them to put new windows into the building, and that really helped us out."
Wolfe said he and Raezer, 52, hope to

Wolfe said he and Raezer, 52, hope to have all six apartments fully renovated — and open a cafe with outdoor seating in the former restaurant space — within the next two years.

"I couldn't be happier that they're

"I couldn't be happier that they're down here for the adjacent homeowners and the businesses," Wolfe said. "This city has some incredible buildings and areas in it. Sure it needs some help. But Erie is a really interesting place."

Big moves for the neighborhood

Since launching in 2016, Our West Bayfront has been busy with projects throughout its service area. The nonprofit neighborhood organization focuses on improving the area from Presque Isle Bay south to West 12th Street and from Sassafras Street west to the Bayfront Parkway.

Bayfront Parkway.

Those initiatives include installing an 1,850 square-foot splash park at Bayview Park near West Second and Cherry streets that includes features which dump water from above, spray mlst and bubble up from the ground; sidewalk improvements; home rehabilitation; building renovations; enhanced neighborhood security cameras/lighting; community gardens; neighborhood cleanups; and public art.

Our West Bayfront unveiled its newest project on Feb 5: A new headquarters in a 139-year-old, 5,200 square foot building in the 400 block of West Eighth Street.

The building, constructed in 1882, housed Howard's Photography for decades but had failen into disrepair and was vacant for years before Our West Bayfront purchased the property for \$30,000 in 2018.

The first floor also includes a community meeting space and roughly 1,000 square feet of retail/commercial space that will be available for rent; three upper-floor apartments were also refurbished as part of the \$1 million prolect.

The nonprofit neighborhood organization has also been prolific at attracting grant dollars — roughly \$2.6 million thus far — that are crucial to those projects, which aim to boost the quality of life in Erie's west bayfront neighborhoods.

Our West Bayfront's grant funding, since 2017, includes:

- \$560,000 from the Erie Community Foundation
- \$500,000 from the Pennsylvania
- Housing Finance Agency
 \$382,000 from the Erie County
 Gaming Revenue Authority

 Smaller grants from other groups, including the Brie Redevelopment Authority and the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development

The group has also tapped into state tax credit programs, via Gannon University for \$175,000 each year for various programs and administrative various programs.

ous programs and administrative costs.
"They helped make my place a lot better," sald Erie's Anthony Williams, who received a \$7,911 Our West Bayfront grant in 2020 for facade repairs, including new windows and doors, at his home in the 100 block of Walnut Street.
Our West Bayfront "has made a big

Our West Bayfront "has made a big difference" in the neighborhood, said Williams, a west bayfront resident for more than 20 years. "The things they've done at Bayview Park, that's been one of the biggest improvements. Things are just a lot nicer."

'We have a plan'

Anna Prantz, Our West Bayfront's executive director, said she believes the group's success in attracting grants can be attributed largely to its comprehensive plan for west bayfront neighborhoods, completed in 2016 that was heavily shaped by input from residents and businesses.

That plan laid out a detailed community improvement strategy, Frantz said. Many of those initiatives have been completed or are underway.

"We have a plan, and we're guided by that document," said Frantz, who earns \$76,790 as the organization's full-time

director. "We had projects that we knew we wanted to get started on, and I think that we have been able to show how we will get them done and the ways we can leverage funding to get additional dollars."

Perry Wood agrees.

As ECGRA's executive director, Wood has seen and helped scrutinize Our West Bayfront's grant applications to his agency. ECGRA annually distributes millions of dollars in gross revenues from Presque Isle Downs & Casino into municipalities, neighborhood associations and other nonprofit agencies for a range of programs, events and community improvements that benefit the public.

The Gaming Revenue Authority, for example, in 2019 awarded a \$250,000 grant that is being used to help fund Our West Bayfront's improvement plans for the West Eighth Street business and retail corridor.

That area includes Our West Bayfront's newly-revamped office and the property that Wolfe and Raezer pur-

"Their progress has been tremendous and that's one of the reasons we continue to invest with them," Wood said.

Wood added that Our West Bayfront's long-term plan also aligns with Eric Refocused, the city's long-range comprehensive development plan, which addresses the city's future need in a number of areas including housing, transportation, land use and economic development.

"They've continually made focused investments, which is what (Erie Refocused) recommends," Wood said.

Engaging residents

Kaitlyn Falk, 25, helps Our West Bayfront make those investments — especially when it comes to youth — as one of the neighborhood group's most active volunteers.

"I lived my whole life in the west bayfront," said Falk, the community schools coordinator at Strong Vincent Middle School, 1330 W. Bighth St., who also lives in the area. "I'm lucky because I get to participate in a lot of Our West Rayfront activities as a part of my loh."

Bayfront activities as a part of my job."
Falk has led youth fitness classes at Bayview Park, helped out with Thanks giving dinners at the Martin Luther King Center, and volunteered at National Night Out events in Gridley Park owest Sixth Street, between Poplar and Plum streets. Falk said Our West Bayfront has given residents "the opportunity to be engaged" when it comes to community revitalization.
"What I've noticed is the kids like

"What I've noticed is the kids like having something to do... And from what I've seen, a lot of the neighbors and the Gannon employees who live nearby get a chance to be involved and feel like they're really a part of something," Falk said. "There's a sense of belonging and a sense of ownership."

Our West Bayfront was initially

funded by a \$1.6 million commitment over six years from UPMC Health Plan, Gannon University, Marquette Savings Bank and Erie Insurance.

That funding is not part of the \$2.6 million Our West Bayfront has been able to secure since 2017.

However, that kind of seed money helped to position the neighborhood group as one that would eventually thrive as a "standalone organization" that would help stabilize and improve the "physical environment" in west bayfront neighborhoods, said Keith Taylor, Gannon's president.

Asked about the organization's suc-

Asked about the organization's success in accessing grant funds, Taylor said: "Funders look for stability. They look for who your partners are," Taylor said. "They've earned their own recognition and people's confidence, and all of that has been done in partnership with the neighbors."

Building capacity, 'consistency'

As part of her role as the city of Erie's planning director, Kathy Wyrosdick works closely with neighborhood groups across the city.

She helps bring those groups together for frequent conversations to talk about their projects and find common themes.

And Wyrosdick looks for ways to help them build capacity.

The orres I've seen become successful in Erie have local champions that sponsored development of their strategic plan. The projects they've done align with what the neighborhood says it wants to see. And many of them also hired someone to affect the plan full-time, "Wyrosdick said.

"That makes such a difference. That person has the time to dedicate to a neighborhood plan — it's that simple," Wyrosdick said. "That person can keep the plan on track. And getting grant money is only half the battle, because you have to have someone to administer it and follow all the (regulations) attached to the money.

tached to the money.
"Most volunteer organizations have dedicated people, but many of them just don't have the time or the resources to dedicate to a neighborhood plan," Wyrosdick said.

Frantz, Our West Bayfront's executive director, believes the organization can remain steady, continue to draw funding for development, and make the neighborhoods it serves even more attractive. "It hope that Our West Bayfront continues to be an organization that people feel a part of in this neighborhood, whether they're a homeowner or renter or business owner," Frantz said. "I think we've succeeded in creating more positive energy and a more positive perception of this neighborhood. We want to make it a place where people want to stay and an area that people want to move into."

NOTES ON THE CRISIS



A REPORT on the ERIE COUNTY COVID-19 RESPONSE FUND



As the COVID-19 crisis wreaked havoc on communities and small businesses across the country, ECGRA was recognized by Drexel University Nowak Metro Finance Lab as a "First Mover" in the nation. Erie County's swift response was profiled as a model public-entity fund to reduce the impact of the enormous economic tsunami at hand. This report is a snapshot of the timeline and organizations that benefitted from the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund.

The \$2.35 million

Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund

Three components

- 1. Immediate Human Relief
- 2. Nonprofit Loan Fund
- 3. Small Business Loan Fund

Announced on March 17th, 2020,

just days after Pennsylvania public schools were closed and health officials ordered restaurants and small businesses closed as part of mitigation efforts, the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority (ECGRA) partnered with the Erie County Council to create a three-pronged relief program, the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund.

Leaders proactively created the Fund

after witnessing news reports from larger cities chronicling the spread of the disease, its effects on the population of those cities, and resulting business closures. The Fund focused on small businesses, nonprofits, and humanitarian aid.

Designed to address the crisis

each area of funding was created for multiple stakeholders from multiple perspectives.

"American communities without a public agency like ECGRA, built to connect and invest at all levels of a community, are at a distinct disadvantage in a post-COVID world. ECGRA was built to move swiftly and with public accountability allowing Erie County to get ahead in the crisis, which saved many local organizations from closing their doors to the residents they serve."

The COVID-19 pandemic

arrived with very little warning.

Schools, businesses, and local government were shutting down.

ECGRA leadership pulled from experience and one helpful source early on: The Disaster Philanthropy Playbook, which can be found online at www.disasterplaybook.org.

Serving as a framework for the Response Fund, the Immediate Human Relief components became a grant program for human services agencies on the frontlines of relief. The fund was launched as our community simultaneously faced the worst health and economic crisis of our time. The COVID-19 global pandemic pushed local governments like counties, cities, and boroughs to their limits, with Erie County leaders earning strong reviews across the board.

Erie County Council utilized ECGRA's grantmaking expertise and infrastructure to create the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund. The Response Fund moved the needle and garnered national attention for Erie County.

"In recent history, Erie County had not experienced a pandemic with the potential to kill so many people, cripple the county's quality of life, and devastate the economy. ECGRA's grantmaking infrastructure was the perfect vehicle to get ahead of the crushing humanitarian consequences of COVID-19."

Grants on the Ground ... Fast

The first grant awarded through the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund was swift and impactful. The grant to Second Harvest Food Bank supported 6,000 meals to be distributed throughout Erie County. The \$168,000 award launched the **Immediate Human Relief Fund effort**, providing grants that offered immediate relief to the populations served by food pantries, homeless shelters, child care centers, and elder care centers.

Anticipating that the Food Bank and pantry system would quickly run out of food, ECGRA reached out to the Second Harvest Food Bank and asked them to quantify the challenges that lie ahead. The first grant awarded supported 6,000 meals to be distributed to those in need throughout Erie County over two weeks. We connected their team with Meals on Wheels to work on home delivery to the homebound seniors. The swift action of Erie County Council and the ECGRA Board of Directors allowed for a solution in anticipation of a problem - not a lifeboat when the ship has already sunk.

In an effort to support increased need generated as a result of the COVID-19 global pandemic, Second Harvest packed and distributed Emergency Relief Food Boxes through partners across Erie County. Each Emergency Food Relief Box, which provides 20 meals, costs \$28 to assemble and distribute.

An Emergency Fund grant awarded to Meals on Wheels helped support the cooperative relationship between the home meal delivery organization and Second Harvest Food Bank. Second Harvest Food Bank provided the Emergency Relief Boxes to Meals on Wheels Erie, utilizing funding previously awarded by ECGRA. Pantries and distribution entities that were not previously affiliated with Second Harvest were connected to harness the power of the grant.

The Erie County COVID-19 Emergency Response Fund's first and primary goal is to save lives by supporting those on the front lines of the COVID-19 battle. Grantmakers are uniquely positioned in a crisis because they are regularly in touch with nonprofit institutions that provide a range of lifesaving and -enhancing services. Rapid communication with the leaders in this sector led to an early conclusion: capital was not flowing, and therefore they could not help the people who depend on them.

"These are unprecedented times in which families are in desperate need of food. This crisis is affecting our entire community, and ECGRA quickly answered our call to purchase life sustaining food to help our neighbors."





COVID-19 Response Fund Activated to Sustain Erie County Small Businesses and Nonprofits

The ECGRA-financed fund made patient, flexible loan capital available through Bridgeway Capital.

The \$2.35 million Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund included \$1.6 million of loans to small businesses and non-profits to help meet rapidly rising needs generated as a result of the COVID-19 public health crisis. The ECGRA loans were administered through Bridgeway Capital and included flexible payment schedules tailored to respond to the ever-evolving COVID-19 public health crisis. To help qualified small businesses and nonprofits access loan capital, Bridgeway opened the applications via an Erie County COVID-19 Business Relief webpage immediately and was able to close on 26 loans in just 7 weeks.




Sarah A. Reed Children's Center was awarded **\$11,000** through the Erie County COVID-19 Response Fund to help continue their mission to improve the quality of life for children with mental health, emotional, behavioral health, and trauma-related challenges. When COVID-19 struck, Sarah Reed was serving 1,700 at-risk children and their families, including residents dependent on their life-supporting services.


The Residential Treatment Facility in Millcreek Township is Sarah Reed's most intensive program providing 24/7 housing, medical care, mental health counseling, daily meals, and educational support to 67 children ages 5-18 with significant psychiatric and/or trauma related challenges. Each child is monitored closely by the nursing staff at the on-campus Leslie Medical Center. When COVID-19 hit, they had to implement new safety measures to ensure that children and staff remained healthy.


The grant provided Sarah A. Reed Children's Center an opportunity to immediately purchase new safety equipment, which included infrared forehead thermometers, N95 masks, disposable face shields, and other personal protective equipment to keep all staff and children safe during the crisis. They were also able to obtain new air mattresses, sheets, pillows, blankets, and food equipment to prepare for their residential behavioral staff to shelter-in-place if needed with the children in the Gary Bukowski Sarah A. Reed Children's Center's five residence halls.

The pandemic also required therapists to provide mental health and behavioral counseling remotely. The grant provided 35 therapists with new Google Chromebooks and HIPAA-compliant Zoom licenses so they can continue to provide therapy to their clients remotely.

At the height of the crisis, ECGRA doubled down on an investment to arm area non-profit employees with 500 face shields. ECGRA initially purchased and coordinated the distribution of facemasks for local police and fire with a purchase of 500 face shields.

Along with the investment for non-profits and local police and fire, ECGRA also purchased and supplied employees of 13 public school districts of Erie County with 5,830 face shields.


